ABOUT THIS PROJECT

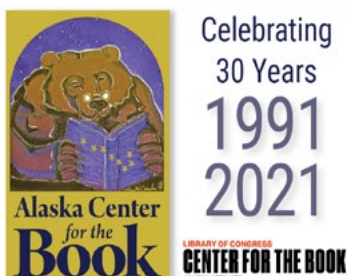
